The Digital Divide

One in five American adults does not use the Internet

- Senior citizens
- Adults with less than a high school education
- Households earning less than \$30,000 per year
- Those who took the Pew Internet Survey* in Spanish rather than English

Digital Divide

Internet Use

- 43% of adults who have not completed high school use the Internet
- 71% of high school graduates
- 94% of college graduates.

Household income is a predictor of Internet use

 Only 62% of those earning less than \$30,000 use the Internet

The Digital Divide

Among adults who do not use the Internet...

- They don't think the Internet is relevant to them.
- Most have never used the Internet, and have no one in their household who does.
- One in five know enough about technology to start using the Internet on their own
- Only one in ten are interested in using the Internet or email in the future.



- E-mail for writing practice when you cannot meet.



- Improve fluency




Podcasts - StoryCorps

U.S. Adult cell phone owners

- 83% own a cell phone
- 50% have apps on their phones
- 35% a Smartphone
- 25% use their phone as their main source of Internet access
- Half of American adults and 80% of online teens use a social networking site like
 Facebook

Google Phone Calls

Sign up for a free Google Voice phone number

- Leave a voice message in English for your learner
- Have your learner call, listen to your message, and leave a voice message for you
- Listen to your learner's message
- This can also be used if you do not want to give your learner your telephone number or if you have multiple numbers where you can be reached.

Go to www.Google.com and select Google Voice

Voice Mail

Practice leaving voice mail messages with your learner on your home or cell phones.

- Write a short script
- Practice pronunciation
- Rehearse
- Have your learner leave a message during your lesson

Make sure your learner has the number you want them to call and understands when they need to call to cancel a lesson.

Texting

Texting is a great way to communicate with your learner if you both have it on your cell

phones.

If you don't know how to text, there are tutorials on YouTube.



Flash Cards

Make flash cards on the web and download them to your learner's smart phone.

- Create your own Flash Cards
- Import cards from computer to phone
- Reads questions and answers
- Built-in timer
- Random order of play
- Flashcardmakerpro is \$4.95
- Other flash card apps are free.



Voice Recording

If your learner has a smart phone, download a free voice recorder app.

- Make a recording of key parts of your lesson for your learner to review
- Have your learner make a recording and listen to his/herself speaking English.
- Learners can practice by listening to the recording between lessons.
- Examples: Voice Recorder, Tape-a-Talk.

Word Games

Free word games can be downloaded for Smart phones, iPads or tablets

- Words with Friends
- Hanging with Friends
- Word Scramble
- Word Search






